In recent seasons, our concerts have spoken to modern day issues we all see in our community. From the impact of gun-violence, to the ongoing war in Ukraine, we believe in raising our voices and instruments to stand for music and unity in our world. In addition to our orchestra programming, the organization continues to support library, museum and school performances in the region.

DC Strings Workshop just this past summer reached more than 300 students across 6 campuses leading band, orchestra, and individual lessons for deserving young people in partnership with DC Public Schools. These students learned piano, percussion, strings, and much more. Through partnerships with Steel on Wheels, Quartertonez Music, DMV Percussion Academy and other community organizations we are keeping music alive in this region and inspiring the next generation of future musicians. None of this would be possible without the support of our board of directors, donors, musicians, and teaching staff. I hope to see you at future performances and thank you for your support and generosity in sustaining our work.

FEATURING Tess Ottinger, Soprano

Tess Ottinger, soprano, is a versatile vocalist based in the Northern Virginia area and is passionate about performing all aspects of the classical art form. She discovered her love for the classical vocal arts when she started her training in 2009 with Metropolitan Opera soprano, Danielle Talamantes. Since then, she has immersed herself in all forms of classical vocal literature, from opera to art song, oratorio, and choral repertoire.

Tess is an alumna of Virginia Commonwealth

University (BM Music Education and Vocal Performance) and the Johns Hopkins Peabody Institute (MM Vocal Performance and Vocal Pedagogy), where she studied with Dr. Stanley Cornett and coached with his wife, Eileen Cornett. Tess currently studies with Elizabeth Daniels and is on the voice faculty of the prestigious Duke Ellington School of the Arts in Washington, DC.

In January, 2023, Tess covered the role of Dalinda in Handel's Ariodante with Pittsburgh Opera, was the recipient of an Encouragement Award from the Metropolitan Opera's Laffont Competition and won first prize in The Music International Grand Prix Semi-finalist competition a winner of the Classical Singer Magazine Summer Feedback Competition.

During the 2022-2023 season she performed throughout the DMV with various organizations, including The Amadeus Orchestra, The Frederick's Children's Chorus, and Clarendon United Methodist Church in several performances of Handel's Messiah, Bach in Baltimore performing Cantata's 184 and 79, and The Young Victorian Theatre Company, performing the role of Mabel in Gilbert & Sullivan's The Pirates of Penzance.



FEATURING Jonothan King, collaborative pianist

Celebrated as a "fresh presence," and "fully alive" (Washington Post), Jonathan King is Associate Conductor for The Washington Chorus and teaches at the Peabody Institute of Johns Hopkins University, where he coaches and conducts with Peabody Opera Theatre. He is also a doctoral candidate in choral conducting at the University of Maryland School of Music, where he has served as assistant conductor, chorus master, and junior lecturer with Maryland Opera Studio. King has prepared choirs to work with eminent conductors including Leonard Slatkin, Marin

Alsop, and Gianandrea Noseda, and regularly serves as assistant conductor to John.

Juan Gallastegui
Music Director & Conductor,
Accord Symphony Orchestra

Juan Gallastegui is the Music Director of the Rockville Concert Band (Rockville, MD), and Music Director of the DC Strings Orchestra (Washington DC). He is an ASCAP member as arranger of many works for concert band and other small ensembles. He is also member of the League of American Orchestras, the National Bands Association, the National Association of Concert Band and the International Conductors Guild.

Since 2016, Gallastegui has established a reputation throughout the Washington, D.C., Maryland, and Virginia area as a conductor and educator and he is in demand to work with community groups, semi-professional orchestras, and youth groups. He has conducted the Loudoun Symphony Orchestra (Ashburn, VA) and the Pro Arte Chamber Orchestra of Greater Washington D.C. From 2019 to 2021, he was the Prince Williams Youth Orchesstras Music Director.

An accomplished euphonium player, Gallastegui played in different wind bands in Spain (e.g. Castro Urdiales Municipal Band, Llodio Wind Band, La Pamplonesa Wind Band) for more than twenty years before moving to the United States where he began to study conducting.

Gallastegui holds a Ph.D. in Music History (University of La Rioja), a Master in Music in Orchestral Conducting (Bard College, NY), and a Master in Education (University of Cantabria). Previously, he earned a B.A. in Musicology (University of La Rioja, Spain) and a double B.M in Tuba Performance and Pedagogy of Tuba (Navarre Conservatory). Among other awards, Dr. Gallastegui was a "Rafael Del Pino Foundation" Scholarship Recipient in 2014. His main conducting teacher and mentor was the late Harold Farberman. Other teachers include Jorma Panula, Lawrence Golan, Mark Gibson, and Leon Botstein in conducting, and Dr. Laurence Wallach and Dr. Kyle Blaha in composition.



CONCERTO SOLOIST Dr. Cecilia Sakong, pianist

Dr. Cecilia Sakong was born in Iowa, U.S.A. She moved to South Korea and began her formal musical training at the age of twelve. She completed her bachelor's degree in Piano Performance and Business at Seoul National University. She moved back to the States for her master's degree in Piano Performance and Literature at the Eastman School of Music, studying with Dr. Enrico Elisi, and doctoral in Piano Performance

at the Pennsylvania State University on a full scholarship as a teaching assistant under the tutelage of Dr. Christopher Guzman.

Having received top prizes in international and local competitions, she has been named the prize-winner of West Virginia International Competition, Colorado International Piano Academy Competition, the Marian Garcia International Piano Competition, The American Prize, Charleston International Music Competition, Penn State University Concerto Competition, and more. Also, she has been pleased to introduce a woman composer, Fanny Mendelssohn, and her recently discovered piece, Das Jahr and to be awarded first prize at Graduate Exhibition at Penn State.

Besides that, she has been recognized as an active teacher, soloist, and collaborative pianist throughout the United States, Europe, and Asia. She was not only invited to teach young students at Triumph Music Festival, Kirov International Music Festival but also performed at the world-famous halls including Kimmel Center and Kennedy Center. While she was pursuing a doctoral, she worked at California University of Pennsylvania as a staff accompanist and piano instructor. She recently continues her musicianship through Professional Performance Certificate at Penn State and works for the Penn State University Choir and Honors Music Institute at Penn State as an accompanist.

FEATURING Andrew Chi, Cellist

Born in Weiden in der Oberpfalz, Germany in 2009, Andrew Chi is an 8th grader at North Bethesda MiddleSchool, in Bethesda,MD.

Andrew recently made a Carnegie Weill Recital debut in October, 2022 and he is scheduled to perform at the Embassy in Bulgaria in February 2023.

He began studying cello at the age of eight and has been passionately participating in the international music festivals, such as Summit Music Festival (NY), Montecito International Music Festival (CA), and Triumph International Music Festival (PA).

Andrew won the 1st prize at the Triumph International Music Competition. As a chamber musician, he recently performed Haydn Piano Trio and Beethoven String Trio at Summit Music Festival. He is also an avid soccer player and plays for the Player Progression Academy (PPA).







FEATURING Anne Val Ter, pianist

Anne Valerie Ter was born in Alexandria, Virginia. Her exceptional academic and musical gifts manifested at a very early age, and her talents have been fostered by her parents from the time she was a toddler. Anne Valerie has been able to read by herself since an early age, and she was a student of the piano before she was three

years old. As a pianist, the balance between Anne Valerie's mathematical skills and musical talent form a symbiotic relationship, allowing her to perform at a level beyond her years.

She regularly participates in piano competitions. In 2019 she won first place in her age group in the Robert Spencer Piano Concerto Competition. As a result she was chosen to perform with Amadeus Orchestra (she played Haydn's Piano Concerto in D Major). In the spring of 2019 she was a winner of Sonata Festival at George Mason University and from 850 young pianists she also was chosen to play at the honor concert there. In 2020 she participated and won Bronze Prize in the 2ND WPTA Finland International Piano Competition and then she got a 3st prize at the 10th International Piano Competition in Milan, Italy. In 2021 she won the Gold North America Regional Award (USA) in the Solo Professional Category of the ICA International Piano Competition in Hanoi, Vietnam in 2021. In October 2021, she competed and won the Grand Prix in the concerto competition at the Triumph Music Festival in Philadelphia. In the fall of 2021 she got invited to perform at the Kimmel Cultural Center in Philadelphia as a featured artist. She won the 1st prize at the DC String Orchestra audition and performed with an orchestra on April, 2022 (she played Mendelssohn Concerto No. 1 in G-minor). Anne Valerie participated in the 2022 AYPO concerto competition and won, so she had gotten the privilege to perform with the American Youth Symphonic Orchestra in Rose M. Schlesinger Hall as a soloist last year. She was the winner of several NVMTA judged recitals, and she has been awarded with the Grand Prix of the International Planet of Arts Festival for four years in a row. In Spring 2022, she won the 1st prize at the Amigdala International Music Competition in Italy. She has performed at several events in Northern Virginia and Washington, DC (embassies, community centers and churches). She won 2 concerto competitions in January 2023, and will be performing with 2 orchestras in the spring. In February, she got to perform at Jazz at Lincoln center in New York. Currently, at the age of twelve, Anne Valerie is an eighth grade student at the Dwight Global School. Anne Valerie is currently enrolled in AYPO in the chamber music program and in AYCO and AYSO orchestras. She is a member of a quartet that recently got second place in the Misbin Chamber Music competition. In addition, she is involved in a range of different activities, including theater, swimming, and tennis.
